Re-opening of Playgrounds Risk Assessment

The Government recently announced that Play Parks could be re-opened on 4 July 2020 and subsequently produced guidance offering “practical advice on how these can be reopened and managed effectively to enable their use while minimising the transmission risk of COVID-19”. The guidance is available at:

The guidance includes a requirement to “carry out an appropriate COVID-19 risk assessment”. It is made very clear that “Failure to complete a risk assessment which takes account of COVID-19, or completing a risk assessment but failing to put in place sufficient measures to manage the risk of COVID19, could constitute a breach of health and safety law”. On that basis, this Risk Assessment takes each of the Key Principles as set out in the guidance and assesses whether or not practical arrangements can be put in place for the Play Areas at Wilburton Recreation Ground & Berristead Close.

Social Distancing	Put in place measures to support social distancing – 2m or 1m plus risk mitigations. The Council can comply with the signage requirements	The onus will be upon users of the facility to ensure they observe social distancing rules. The Council will prominently display guideline notices at both sites. These will contain social distancing advice of 2m and advice that other users should be given space. This notice will also advise people to return later if the play area is busy.
Cleaning and Hygiene	Clean high traffic touch points frequently. This includes: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • All Play Equipment 	It is not practically possible for the Council to ensure users clean the equipment before and	Notices will remind people to use hand sanitizer frequently and to consider wiping down high touch areas before use.

<p>Face Coverings</p>	<p>If possible, a face covering should be worn in enclosed public spaces where social distancing isn't possible and where the public may come into contact with people they do not normally meet. (Face coverings should not be used by children under the age of 3 or those who may find it difficult to manage them correctly).</p> <p>Play Areas owned by Wilburton Parish Council do not contain any enclosed spaces. Both sites are entirely outdoor settings where social distancing is easily achievable.</p>	<p>Most of the play area users are young children (many of whom are under 3) who will struggle to wear a face mask consistently and correctly.</p> <p>Wilburton Parish Council will not recommend that users wear a face mask whilst using play equipment.</p>	<p>The guidelines notice will remind users not to put their mouths on equipment and hands near their faces.</p>
<p>Additional Measures and Communicating with Parents</p>	<p>Promote responsible behaviour by children, parents, carers and guardians. For example, owners and operators should consider putting up signs to make clear to users, parents, guardians and carers that:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • consumption of food or drink on play equipment or in the playground area is banned • parents, guardians or carers should dispose of all litter including any used protective wear such as face coverings or gloves properly in litter bins, taking it home where a bin is not provided. 	<p>The Council can comply with the signage requirements.</p>	<p>The guidelines notice will advise users that</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • unsupervised children are not allowed to use the equipment. • Food and drink should not be consumed in the play areas. • Litter must be properly disposed of or taken home (to include PPE items)

<p>Considering Children with Additional Needs</p>	<p>Take into account the requirements of children with additional needs. Unsupervised children will not be able to use the equipment and therefore the onus can be placed on the accompanying adult to ensure understanding and compliance. The Council is not able to “staff” the play areas.</p>	<p>The supervising adult will need to be responsible for communicating the expectations this risk assessment places on users to all children in their care.</p>	<p>The accompanying adult will also need to ensure they assist/enable children with additional needs to understand and manage these requirements e.g. to maintain social distancing.</p>
<p>Keeping Staff Safe</p>	<p>Consider the risks staff may be exposed to and how these can be mitigated. Staff roles may include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • cleaning playground equipment/surrounding areas • managing queues of those waiting to use equipment • stewarding equipment to ensure users comply with rules made by the owner/operator 	<p>Wilburton Parish Council does not have sufficient human resources to ensure play areas are manned and therefore staff members will not be placed at any risk.</p>	<p>Control measures are not required</p>

Conclusions

Wilburton Parish Council will open the Recreation Playground on Monday 13th July 2020, due to recent work carried out on the play equipment it was deemed that this equipment is suitable to return to use by the public. The Berristead Playground will be opened at a later date after it has been subjected to a thorough inspection by Cllr Morgan and Dave Maltby (Parish Council caretaker). Notices will be highly visible at both sites informing users that the equipment is NOT cleaned by the Council and they use it at their own risk. Notices outlining guidelines to be followed as a result of this risk assessment will also be displayed at both sites. This risk assessment will be kept under regular review.
